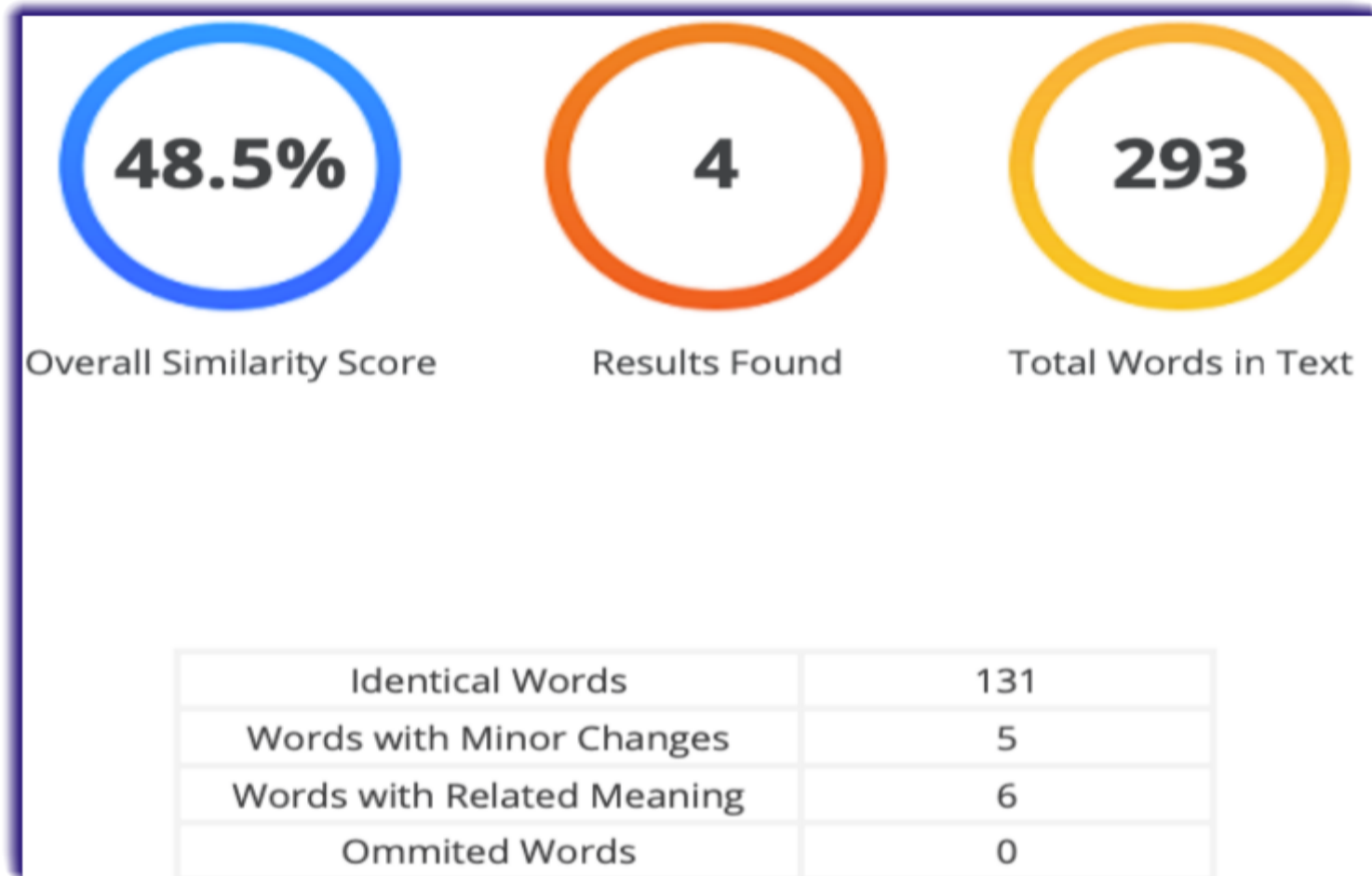






- The report starts with a summary of the Plagiarism Checker's scan.

Both poets use enjambment and free verse to convey the speakers' free flowing thoughts. Both poems show examples of moving from one line to the next without a pause. The free verse helps to resemble the state of mind of the speakers.

Through tone the speakers communicate their state of mind and reflections on their early morning surroundings. Both describe the nature of their surroundings, but "Five A.M." gives a more optimistic, calm, and peaceful tone while "Five Flights Up" presents a struggle to understand life. When the little black dog runs around and happily plays in the yard, the owner yells at him, and the speaker asks, "What has he done?" (l. 18). The tone describes the bird and the dog as free spirits who are thankful they have another day on Earth and do not question why; this observation shows that humans cannot fully understand animals.
